

Heads or Tails Raffle

1. Participants pay a fee to play (say, \$10), and receive a bandana (or badge, or whatever) which identifies them as a player.
2. When the game begins, all bandana-clad participants are standing. The MC asks all participants to put their hands on their head, or their... uh, tail prior to a coin toss. You can't change your mind once you've chosen, and you can't put your hands on anybody else's head (or tail).
3. The MC flips a coin and announces the outcome. If it's Heads, all those with hands on their heads stay standing, if it's Tails, those who chose that option stay in the game. Others sit down and are out of the game.
4. Those still standing again choose heads or tails, and the coin tosses continue until only one person is left standing.
5. He or she wins a nice prize, preferably donated by a sponsor. If you don't have a donated prize, you might be able to charge a little more for the fee to play (say, \$15) and use some of that money as a cash prize.
6. If you can get a sponsor for the easily visible items like a bandana, badge or whatever, you could make \$10 for every participant!
7. If you're looking for a source for bandanas, you can try <http://www.bandannapromotions.com/> but there are many other less expensive promotional items that could work or could be made. However, in the tree care industry (and cyclist world), a bandana can be a very practical, useful and visible item that would be worth a \$10 or \$15 donation.
