

DAVEY SUPPORTS HIGH SCHOOL ARBORICULTURE PROGRAM

High school students studying arboriculture are getting some brand-new, professional grade climbing equipment thanks to support from Davey.

Davey made a \$10,000 donation to the arboriculture program at Theodore Roosevelt High School, located next to the corporate campus. The money, along with a \$5,000 grant from the TREE Fund, will pay for the purchase of 15 new sets of climbing gear, which includes ropes, harnesses, lanyards and carabiners.

The program is part of a six-district compact which includes students from across Northeast Ohio. Students in the program have worked alongside Davey employees, including at The John Davey Arboretum, to learn proper pruning and other tree care methods.

Davey President and CEO Pat Covey presented the donation to Tom Franek, the program's instructor, this summer.

Davey Tree donates to forestry program

The program, part of the Six District Compact with students from Woodridge, Stow, Tallmadge, Hudson, Cuyahoga Falls and Kent, is a one-of-a-kind program in Ohio where students learn tree climbing for pruning purposes. The money, coupled with a \$5,000 grant from the International Association of Arboriculture's Tree Fund and shopping at Davey Tree's corporate discount, afforded TRHS 15 new sets of climbing gear such as ropes, harnesses, and lanyards with giant carbiners. Franek and fellow instructor John Lang said safety is paramount and the commercial grade equipment has to support someone's life. Students in the program have worked in some City of Kent parks as well as on the Hike and Bike Trails, according to Franek.

Davey Tree, Kent Roosevelt students partner in planting

Davey Tree Expert Co. and Theodore Rootend to the arboretum's landscape. sevelt High School in Kent firmly rooted their partnership in arboriculture training with a symbolic tree planting this fall.

Employees at Davey and students of the school's forestry and landscape management program planted an ivory silk tree lilac, Syringa reticulata, at The John Davey Arboretum. The teams planted the tree in celebration of their long-lasting relationship caring for the park space and collaborating to support the students' tree care education. The maintenance agreement for the tree incorporates tree care lessons for the students and provides real-world experience as they

Davey's relationship with Roosevelt's arboriculture program began in 1995 when the company helped launch the program. More recently, Davey donated \$10,000 to buy new

climbing and safety equipment for the students.
Also planted during the fall event was a Cornelian cherry tree, Cornus mas, the first tree in a series of memorial trees established to honor Davey employees or groups who had exceptional careers or great accomplishments. The cherry tree was planted in honor of Dr. Bal Rao, who retired as the manager of research and technical development in 2014 after a 35-year career at Davey.





COMPACT COMPASS grant enters Phase II with summer workshop for special ed

In July, special education teachers and intervention specialists from the Compact an other area districts participated in a two-day summer workshop focused on ways to link academic content standards through service learning.

This initiative is part of an additional \$49,999 Innovative Strategies Grant for Phase I which follows the success of the 2016-17 COMPACT COMPASS: THE FOUR E'S INITIATIVE. This funding allowed the Six District Educational Compact to focus on care development opportunities and secondary transition services for students with disabilities as well as projects to introduce teams of middle school students to career development.

Led by consultants **Kathy Myer** and **Ellen Erlanger**, the summer workshop provided a planning model in which high school students with multiple disabilities partnered with first graders to study the Iditarod race.
