#### In Memoriam

At press time, we learned of the passing of the incomparable Hyland R. Johns, August 11, at age 95.

A long time executive at Asplundh, Hyland was a giant and innovator in the utility industry, and one of the last of the great generation of arborists that helped



chart the path of arboriculture. He was active in the original International Shade Tree Conference (which became the ISA) and the Utility Arborist Association. A strong proponent of research, Hyland was one of the original founders of the ISTC Research Fund, which became the TREE Fund. The Hyland R. Johns Grant Program, which supports research that directly affects the work of industry professionals, fittingly bears his name.

"We will remember him as a true friend worthy of our admiration," Russell King, TREE Fund president and CEO said, "and we offer condolences to all who knew and loved him."

# Leading thoughts

Your participation in the virtual Tour des Trees (see above) is key to the health of the TREE Fund, but there are additional ways to help. Last month, I wrote of some indirect ways to help, so this month I'll note some more direct ways.

- <u>Give.</u> The pandemic put a hitch in our fundraising giddy up, so your generosity is especially important now.
- Participate in the **virtual Tour des Trees.**
- Participate in the **Heritage Oak Society** (planned giving).
- Create social media messages —aka virtual storytelling—on your own (and/or company) pages on Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, and Instagram. It can be an eye-catching picture with a quick message of support. Use hashtags and a link to our "ways to give" page when possible.
- Or—and this can be real fun—create a video. Personal video is unique and persuasive. Perhaps talk about a particular tree, a tree planting or tree care tip, fun facts about a tree or trees in general, the importance of trees, even personal reflections on the love of trees—then conclude with a gentle push toward the TREE Fund. Videos in which stories are told are particularly engaging—consider telling a story about how some research



supported by the TREE Fund helped you or your colleges.

- Set up a fundraising page. You can set up fundraising pages online that are personalized by you for your online friends. Such pages on Facebook, as one example, have already brought more than \$1,000 to the TREE Fund in 2020.
- Share the word. Talk about the TREE Fund to peers, family, friends, and others. Talk about how important the TREE Fund is to you—make it personal, real, from the heart, and in your own voice. If you're on Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn or Instgram, friend, like, link to other otherwise affiliate with the TREE Fund's pages and then share what the TREE Fund posts as often as you can. Add your own comments or hashtags in support. Do you have a personal or professional website? If so, create a link on it to the TREE Fund website (perhaps even include a new link each month to the TREE Press). Explore whether your employer, service club, or local arboretum or environmental group would do the same.
- Telling people in the tree care and landscape architect professions about the TREE Fund's free webinars, and the availability of CEUs, will be helpful. Even just passing along the email or social media notices you receive can bring new eyes to the TREE Fund brand.
- When shopping on Amazon, sign up for Amazon Smile and designate the TREE Fund as the charity of your choice. Encourage others to do likewise.
- When using PayPal to make purchases, you have the opportunity to donate \$1 to the TREE Fund.
