## **Distribution of TREE Fund grants 2002-2022**

Below are maps and graphs that show the distribution of the grants the TREE Fund has made, both in the US and worldwide.

The process of grant selection is designed to ensure that grants are awarded according to the established criteria and without preference or bias. The process:

- 1. Letters of interest are submitted and reviewed by a member of the TREE Fund staff and a volunteer arborist for compliance with grant priorities.
- 2. If a letter of interest is approved, an application is sent to researcher.
- 3. A member of the TREE Fund staff reviews each application's word count, budget, matching funds, etc. for compliance with established rules.
- 4. The chair of the Research and Education Committee Chair—who is also a member of the TREE Fund Board of Trustees--reviews the applications to gauge project viability.
- 5. Accepted applications go to the committee for rankings and comments.
- 6. A Zoom meeting is conducted with review committee for review of applications and a vote on recommendations for funding.
- 7. The TREE Fund Board of Trustees votes on the committee's recommendations for grant awards. The minutes of all board meetings are publicly available on the TREE Fund website.
- 8. Awardees are notified and sent a grant agreement.




Figure 2. Distribution of TREE Fund grants within the United States.




Figure 3. Pie chart of percentages of grants domestic and foreign.




Figure 4. Graph of number of US states and other countries where grants have been made.




Figure 5. Bar chart showing the percentage of the total number of grants-made locations in the US.
