



A note from TREE Fund President/CEO

Dear TREE Fund Supporters,

2024 has felt like a year of new beginnings. We welcomed a new staff member, Suzette Guzman-Brown, returning our hardworking full-time team to four, welcomed five new Trustees, and reinstituted several Board committees that had been fallow for a few years. Operationally, we began the transition to a new accounting contractor, launched a new TeamRaiser site for Tour des Trees and other fundraising, and upgraded our customer relationship management database.

Excitement around TREE Fund's programs continues to build and we saw increased engagement from our passionate community of supporters, volunteers, and partners. We had 79 riders tackle the Tour des Trees in New England in September, which we kicked off at the historic Bartlett Arboretum to help celebrate International Society of Arboriculture's (ISA) centennial at the place where it all began. Hundreds of volunteers joined us during the week to participate in outreach events where we shared our love and knowledge of trees. Fundraising was a bit shy of goals and we continue to look forward to new opportunities to engage with sponsors and groups during the Tour.

Our webinar series continued to thrive, engaging thousands of participants worldwide, during our six webinars, including over 1,100 attendees and 941 CEUs awarded for just one webinar session in July. Thanks to our generous sponsors and donors, these webinars remain free and accessible to all. We refreshed and updated our communications materials, brought back the Research Report publication, and created a sponsorship kit.

The board asked that the President/CEO spend 25% of their time traveling and representing the organization, making connections to potential partners and sponsors, providing updates on TREE Fund activities, etc. By the end of December, I traveled a total of 35% of my time, including 11 ISA chapter conferences and several site visits to see funded projects. I also facilitated onstage industry conversations with ISA's Caitlyn Pollihan and TCIA's Dave White at both the ISA Centennial conference and TCIA Expo. It was great to have TREE Fund up on stage with leaders from these two founding partner organizations.

The end of 2024 saw us prep for the new year, putting together a launch of new grantmaking software (to enhance the experience of both applicants and our volunteer reviewers) and the Davey Tree Expert Company Community Arboriculture Education Grant, a new endowment supporting community-based arboricultural education across the United States. 2025 is shaping up to be a year of putting things in order and building upon relationships established and rekindled this year.

We couldn't do this without you. Your commitment to TREE Fund's mission makes our work possible. Together, we are making a lasting impact on arboriculture and urban forestry. With thanks.

TREE Fund Grants

TREE Fund Sponsored Grants:

Organizations or individuals may directly fund research projects that are administered by TREE Fund, which will charge a 7.5% service fee to be paid by the sponsor(s). These projects must be compatible with TREE Fund's mission, must be designed and documented with rigorous scientific protocols, and must not serve to promote proprietary products or services.

State Game Lands Project

The Pennsylvania State Game Lands 33 (SGL 33) research project in central Pennsylvania began in 1953 in response to public concern about the impact of vegetation management practices on wildlife habitat within electric transmission rights-of-way (ROW). The research study was started in 1952.

TREE Fund has administered this Sponsored Grant Program through the partnership of Asplundh Tree Expert, LLC, Corteva Agriscience, First Energy Corporation and PECO Energy Company beginning in 2018.

An additional \$164,237 was granted in 2024 towards the State Game Lands Project.

TREE Fund Grant Programs

TREE Fund has eight research grant programs and two education grant programs that provide grants to various needs within the arboriculture industry.

Endowed grants are funded by income generated from investments based on the size of the principle in each program, creating sustainable grant-making money once a funding level has been met.

John Z. Duling Grant Program

Provides start up or seed funding to support innovative research and technology transfer projects

Jack Kimmel International Grant Program

Provides funding for arboriculture research by applicants working primarily outside of the United States.

Bob Skiera Memorial Fund Building Bridges Initiative and John P. White Grant Program

Supports projects which will help arborists and urban foresters communicate the value of trees and urban forests on a global basis through technology transfer and engagement with developers, builders, civil engineers, city planners, elected officials and other policymakers.

Safe Arborist Techniques Fund Grant Program

Supports original research that creates a safer work environment for people working in the tree care industry and the general public they serve.

Tree and Soil Research Fund Grant Program

Supports projects with research of interest to the landscape architecture community with special focus in the area of trees and soils that support them.

Barborinas Family Fund Grant Program

Supports work with study of the processes of the nursery industry with the focus on root system and above ground structures.

Utility Arborist Research Fund Grant Program

Supports work with real importance and benefit to utility tree care professionals.

Asplundh - Hyland R. Johns Endowed Research Fund Grant Program

Supports research that directly affects the work of industry professionals.

Ohio Chapter ISA Education Grant Program

Funded by Ohio Chapter ISA to provide arboricultural education programs or projects within the State of Ohio which serve a target population of 16 years of age or older.

The Davey Tree Expert Company Community Arboriculture Education Grant Program

Funded by The Davey Tree Expert Company to provide funding support for education/training in tree care and/or urban forestry topics.

TREE Fund Webinar Series

Researchers who previously received TREE Fund grants report on their findings during the TREE Fund Webinar Series. This continues to be TREE Fund's most visible program to certified arborists around the globe.

Six webinars were held in 2024. Topics included:

- Mitigating risk of failure during tree removal
- Predictors of tree survival
- Biochar for tree growth

Over 5,000 people attended our webinars in 2024. Over 4,300 CEUs were credited to certified arborists.





"New research is important to me for two reasons:

- (1) Arboriculture and Urban Forestry remain relatively young disciplines, and we have much to learn whether it is in the applied science of growing and maintaining landscape trees, the continued development of safer practices for working in trees or figuring out how to maximize the opportunities for all communities to engage with trees and reap the benefits that they provide.
- (2) Climate change has necessitated additional areas of research for better understanding of the dynamics associated with rising greenhouse gas concentrations on our ecosystems. Such research will help us develop strategies that promote resilience in our urban forests."

Tour des Trees and ISA Chapter Involvement

2024 Tour des Trees: Roots and Routes of New England

In 2024, TREE Fund's Tour des Trees bike ride traveled to New England with 79 riders and used the opportunity to help the International Society of Arboriculture celebrate its 100th year by planting a tree where it all started, on the grounds of what is now the Bartlett Arboretum and Gardens in Stamford, CT.

TREE Fund and Tour des Trees representatives were able to participate in 12 outreach events during the week, interacting with various volunteer groups, schools, high school students, and other tree enthusiasts. The location also allowed us to meet with several of TREE Fund's corporate partners, getting them even more visibility in the community.

Highlights of this year's ride included a ferry ride and loop around Martha's Vineyard, Professor Pricklethorn presenting to over 150 kids at MacDonough Elementary School, and planting a tree at a national park, Roger Williams Memorial.

Thirty-eight TREE Fund supporters also joined the Tour from home by participating in the Virtual Tour des Trees.









International Society of Arboriculture Chapter Involvement

Twenty-one of the domestic ISA Chapters had volunteer liaisons who worked hard to help TREE Fund spread the word about our grants, scholarships, webinars, and other programs in 2024.

Having a relationship at the chapter level allows TREE Fund to attend chapter conferences and interact with potential researchers, supporters, and donors. These liaisons also played a critical role in helping with fundraising for TREE Fund at a local level.

By organizing fundraising events and through other giving, chapters donated almost \$78,000 to TREE Fund in 2024.

Questions and Answers:

Q. Who runs TREE Fund?

A. TREE Fund is governed by its volunteer board of trustees, the members of which are elected by the board. The board sets high-level policy and strategic plans to achieve TREE Fund's mission. TREE Fund is directed by a staff of paid, nonprofit professionals who advise the board, implement the board's directives, and manage day-to-day operations.

Q. Who serves on the TREE Fund Board of Trustees?

A. Traditionally, the board has been composed of arboriculture professionals, researchers, and college-level educators. In recent years, TREE Fund has recognized the wisdom of greater diversity and joined the nonprofit movement to recruit trustees from beyond the traditional groups. The chief criteria are now an ability and willingness to advance TREE Fund's mission and a preference and capacity for high-level, strategic thinking.

Q. How is TREE Fund funded?

A. Charitable donations and the investment earnings on endowed funds; the endowments were created by charitable donations.

Q. Are donations to TREE Fund tax deductible?
